Hope, long night ahead for Atiku

or а second consecutive time, Alhaji Atiku Abubakar at the weekend picked
 presidential ticket of the People's Democratic the Party (PDP) at a keenly contested primary of the main opposition political grouping in Abuja.

He polled 371 votes to beat his closest rival, Nyesom Wike who scored 237 while Bukola Saraki came a distant third with 70 votes.

Udom Emmanuel polled 38 votes. Bala Mohammed 20, Anyim Pius Anyim 14 while both Sam Ohuambuwa and Tariella Diana Olivier scored one vote each. Ayo Fayose and Dele Momodu got none.

Atiku's victory, no doubt, will give the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC) an opportunity to explore options for fixing the debacle of its presidential ticket.

is believed that APC's choices will now be narrowed to two. One is to search for a credible northern candidate out of its aspirants who can split area's votes with Atiku to prevent PDP from unseating the ruling party. This is where the consideration for Senate President Ahmad Lawan and Kogi Governor Yahaya Bello may come in.

Coming from the Northeast as Atiku and being a northerner with wide political connections by virtue of his parliamentary position and experience, Lawan may be a better choice for the party. Bello is from North Central.

hand, On the other APC leadership may be constrained to search for someone with a deep pocket and financial muscle who can match Atiku. This is where Asiwaju Bola Tinubu comes in. However, with federal financial support, Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi,

Vice President Yemi Osinbajo Nigerian and Governors Forum Chairman Dr. Kayode Fayemi can also successfully challenge Atiku.

Supporters of the former Lagos State governor and APC national leader positively of the PDP responded to results presidential primary. They said this gives them hope that the APC leadership has no choice than to allow a free contest which will throw up Tinubu.

They believe he is the only one out of APC's 28 aspirants that can match Atiku's influence and financial war chest for a keen contest.

himself Tinubu, expressed this belief in his congratulatory message to Atiku by welcoming the former Vice President to a contest for the nation's most exalted political office in 2023.

Tinubu commended Atiku for his patriotism and commitment to Nigeria's progress. He also congratulated the other contestants for the orderly and peaceful way they conducted themselves and for pledging to rally round the winner, in the true spirit of democratic

sportsmanship. The APC national leader said Atiku's victory didn't come as a surprise to Nigerians because of his vast experience as a statesman and veteran of many presidential contests from 1993.

A statement by Bavo Onanuga , Director, Media & Communication, Tinubu Campaign Organisation said the APC hopeful expected Atiku "to be his worthy opponent, by the Grace of God and the support of APC delegates, in the coming 2023 President election.

"I welcome the victory of Alhaji Atiku Abubakar as the candidate of the Peoples Democratic Party in the just concluded primary. I look forward to squaring up with him as a worthy opponent in the coming election. I have known the former Vice President as a formidable politician and a patriot

who believes in the unity and progress of our dear country.

Tinubu added that the coming election should be about issues that will improve the quality of life of Nigerians; bring peace, progress, political stability and solve myriads of sociopolitical challenges and insecurity facing the country.

However, it is believed the the 2023 presidential race will be among candidates of APC, PDP, the Labour Party and the New Nigeria Peoples Party (NNPP).

It is expected that the Labour Party (LP) which is the arrowhead of the third force movement will field former governor of Anambra State, Peter Obi.

Obi who until last Wednesday was one of the PDP leading aspirants dumped the party to pitch his tent with LP under which parties like the SDP, ADC and labour unions are subsumed.

Also, a former governor of Kano State, Musa Rabiu Kwankwaso, will run on the platform of his New Nigeria People's (NNPP). It was Party learnt that Kwankwaso's strong presidential aspiration aborted the alliance talks the party had with Peter Obi immediately after the latter left PDP.

Obi was said to have rejected Kwankwaso's vice presidential offer, hence, his decision to join the Labour Party on Friday. Atiku Meanwhile, in his acceptance speech said history was made by his victory because it laid the foundation that will bring about fundamental changes in governance and political

process. "It marks another milestone in the process to consolidate our democratic gains," he said.

If elected president, Atiku promised to unify Nigerians and Nigeria, alleging that the APC government under President Muhammadu Buhari has disunited the country and her citizens completely.

He added that his administration will confront all economic challenges facing the country bv reversing every antipeople economic policies and programmes of APC government.

Atiku called for support from other contestants in his campaign processes, urging them that the party's interest should be paramount at this time. He promised to give them sense of belonging in the PDP government to be formed in 2023.

He commended the party particularly, leadership, the National Convention Organizing Committee headed by Senator David Mark for a transparent election process.

But apex Igbo socio-political organization, organization, Ohanaeze Ndigbo Worldwide, has said Atiku will never become Nigeria's president.

Ohanaez denounced the PDP primary that produced Atiku as an "erratic and corrupt process that was overseen by the unpatriotic Northerners against the Southern part of the country.'

Secretary-Ohanaeze General, Mazi Okechukwu Isiguzoro, stressed that the Igbo would rise up against Atiku and his campaign rejected in the South-East. He noted that the PDP had been reduced to a Northern party.

In a statement, Isiguzoro lamented that the Igbo were schemed out of the PDP presidential primaries. He said: "It's amusing that PDP is now a political party for the Northern region, with Dr. Iyorcha Ayu as PDP Chairman, Walid Jubril as BOT Chairman and Atiku Abubakar as 2023 PDP Presidential candidate.

"PDP has fulfilled her threats to sideline the Igbo in 2023 and we will carefully answer them back. Another Northerner, Senator David Mark supervised the process that schemed out Igbo from PDP. The consequences of the 2022 PDP convention will be a discontinuity of milking of Igbo votes by a party that butchered the Igbo's dream.

"We are waiting for the APC presidential primary to take the final decision on whether or not Igbos will participate in the 2023 elections.

"Atiku Abubakar will be opposed in the South-East, and no Igbo is anticipated to champion or project Atiku Presidency in the East. Nobody is going to take the risk of campaigning for Atiku in the East since the PDP is now a regional northern political party. Atiku will not have Igbo support in 2023, he cannot be the President of Nigeria in 2023.

A brazen AFFRONT to southern Nigeria

Southern and Middle Belt Leaders Forum described Atiku's emergence as a brazen affront on the people of Southern Nigeria by the PDP.

It said: "SMBLF recalls that following the release of the guidelines for the 2023 general elections by the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), Elders and Leaders of Southern Nigeria and the Middle Belt, under the aegis of the Southern and Middle

Belt Leaders' Forum, made unequivocal proclamations the need for the on presidency to be devolved to Southern Nigeria in 2023, in respect of the timehonoured practice of the rotation and zoning of high political offices between the North and the South by political parties as a way of strengthening national unity, peace and harmony.

"SMBLF further recalls that several engagements were held with various stakeholders across the length and breadth of the country on the subject to foster understanding, mutual respect, and oneness. The 17 Southern Governors also in a declaration after their meeting in Asaba, Delta State, in May 2021, backed the rotation of the presidency to the South in 2023.

"Sadly, it appears the unity and peace of Nigeria mean little or nothing to a segment of the nation's political elite.

This was evidenced in the PDP special convention, which was held on Saturday, 28th May 2022, where certain candidates from the North were pressured, coerced, and even intimidated to step down for former Vice President, Alhaji Atiku Abubakar, who eventually emerged as the flag bearer of PDP, in utter derision of the established principle of zoning and rotation of power between the north and south.

"Undoubtedly, the singular motive is to perpetuate the hegemony of the North given that President Muhammadu Buhari, a Muslim from the North and of Fulani origin will be completing his full tenure of eight years by this

time next year. "SMBLF, therefore, totally REJECTS the candidacy of Alhaji Atiku Abubakar of the PDP and calls on our people of Southern Nigeria and the Middle Belt as well as all true lovers of peace and unity NOT TO VOTE for him or any other Northerner in the 2023 Presidential election, in the interest of posterity.

NDLEA nabs wanted drug kingpin in Ondo Italy-based Nigerian excretes 95 pellets of Heroin at Abuja airport

National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) has arrested a drug lord that has been on a wanted list for five months.

A statement by the agency's irector of Media and Director of Femi Babafemi, Advocacy, on Sunday said Henry Chukwuneku Okamaru was behind a 2000.6kg cannabis sativa seized in a concrete mixer truck in Adamawa State. He said: "Wanted

"Investigations reveal that Okamaru is one of the leaders of a cannabis cultivation cartel that operates in the Ondo-Ekiti axis, while he shuttles between Osun. Ondo, Ekiti, Edo and Delta State from where he coordinates supplies of illicit consignments to Northern parts of the country and Lagos State. "The drug lord has also been

identified as a member of an international drug trafficking ring, while he shuttles between Nigeria and South Africa where he settles his family. He has a strong control and stake in cannabis cultivation in Ondo, Edo, Ekiti, Osun and Oyo States with large storage facilities in Lagos and Abbi in Delta State from where his consignments are distributed year round."

In another development, a 36-year-old Nigerian based in Italy, Nwakanma Michael Uche, has been arrested by NDLEA at Nnamdi Azikiwe Ínternational Airport (NAIA) Abuja for ingesting pellets of heroin.

Nwakanma who hails from, Arodizuogu Village, Ideato Local Government Area of Imo State was nabbed while trying to board Air France Airline enroute Abuja-Paris-Milan, Italy on Sunday 15th May 2022. He was thereafter kept under observation during which he excreted 95 pellets of the illicit

drug. "He claimed he came to see Nicoria after 12 his parents in Nigeria after 12 years in Italy and to complete his fathers traditional marriage rites. He added that he was to be paid N1.5million after a successful delivery of the drugs in Milan," Babafemi started.

Meanwhile, across the five states of Edo, Kaduna, Kogi,

Akwa Ibom and Ovo, NDLEA operatives intensified their offensive action against drug cartels, the spokesperson added.

"In Edo, a pharmacy along Sapele Road, Benin, was raided on Friday 27th May following intelligence prolonged surveillance. and The owner of the store, Thaddeus Uliagbafusi, 58, was arrested while a total of 130,670 tablets of different controlled drugs, 1,396 ampoules of pentazocine injection and 743 bottles of códeine were recovered from a secret location where the drugs are repackaged. This followed a similar raid of a drug joint operated by Mrs. Christianah Gabriel, 53, at Uromi, Esan North East LGA, Edo state, who was arrested with 25kg cannabis

While 15, 000 ampoules of pentazocine injection were seized by operatives in Kaduna along Abuja-Kaduna express road, 12,500 tablets of Diazepam were intercepted along OkeneAbuja highway on Thursday 26th May. The drug exhibits were found inside a truck conveying motor spare parts from Onitsha, Anambra to

Kaduna. "In Akwa Ibom, a female drug dealer, Irene Emmanuel was arrested on Bassev Saturday 28th May, during a search of her house at Ikpa town, Esit Eket LGA where 30.5kg cannabis was recovered, while one Muideen Rasaki was nabbed with 90.8kg cannabis at

Elere, Boluwaji area of Ibadan South-East LGA," he stated. According to Babafemi, Chairman/Chief Executive of NDLEA, Brig Gen Mohamed Buba Marwa (Rtd), commended the officers and men of the Directorate of Intelligence, NAIA, Edo, Kaduna, Kogi, Akwa Ibom and Oyo State Commands of the Agency for the series of arrests and seizures in the past week.

The anti-narcotics boss charged all operatives of the Agency across the country not to relent in their offensive action against drug cartels and their kingpins.

How Joel-Onowakpo Thomas emerged as APC's candidate for Delta State South Senatorial District Accuses PDP of buying votes

elta South Senatorial District candidate of the All Progressive Congress (APC), Hon. Joel-Onowakpo Thomas, has accused the People's Democratic Party (PDP) of using foreign currencies in buying votes during the latter's just concluded primary elections in the country.

He spoke immediately after he was affirmed as the consensus candidate by delegates of the APC in Delta South Senatorial District at Oleh Civic Centre, Isoko South Local Government Area of the state.

He was affirmed with 285 votes while 75 ballots were void as 360 delegates were accredited. The result was declared by returning Officer, Mrs Nkechi Anukan.

According to him: "The former President Goodluck Jonathan said in a viral video that what is happening in the country today is that the delegates who are electing people who will represent them are not well informed.

"Like I heard, what is happening in PDP, people are spending huge amount of money in dollars to get their names on the ballot. Önce you collect money to vote who will represent you on the ballot they cannot really represent you well effectively. "The consequences is that

those who ought not to represent you will represent you in the ballot. And that is chaotic, you can't get any good thing out of it."

On his programme, Thomas said that as somebody with wide experience in private and public service, he will work assiduously with his colleagues in the National Assembly to ensure the primary healthcare situation in the country is addressed ss in a more dynamic way.

He noted that most of the health challenges in Nigeria killing people are not sicknesses ss that should take them out of the country. He noted that they are little sicknesses s like



High Blood Pressure and Malaria, assuring that with his colleagues in the National Assembly they will find a sustainable way out.

He again affirmed that the APC in Delta State is well organized and more united

compared are to 2018 when he joined the party.

"Factions have come together to work for the victory of the party in Delta State come 2023 general elections," he stressed. He again commended Deputy Senate President Ovie Omo-Agege, the state party chairman Elder Sobotie Omene, delegates and leaders of Delta South Senatorial District for giving him the opportunity to be on the ballot for the 2023 general election.

Extend deadline for voter registration or face legal action, SERAP tells INEC

Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) should "im-mediately extend the deadline for voter registration to give more time for eligible Nigeri-ans to exercise their right to participation the same way the electoral body has extended the

deadline for party primaries." This call is from SERAP to INEC chairman, Professor Mahmud.

Against its earlier stance, the INEC last week suddenly extended the deadline for the conduct of primaries by political parties by six days, from June 3 to June 9. Also, the online pre-registration ends by May 30 2022 while the ongoing Continuous Voter Registration (CVR) ends by 30 June 2022. In the letter dated 28 May 2022 and signed by SERAP deputy director Kolawole Oluwadare, the organisation said: "Voters are also critical stakeholders in the electoral process. Treating all eligible Nigerian voters fairly would advance the people's right to vote and to participate in their own government.

"Extending the voter registration deadline would provide more time for eligible voters, including young people, the elderly, people living with disability, as well as those resident in states facing security challenges and living in IDP camps to participate in the 2023 elections.

Extending the deadline for voter registration would be entirely consistent with constitutional and international standards, and the Electoral Act.

Any such extension would also not impact negatively on the INEC's election calendar and activities.

"INEC mandates ought to be exercised in a fair, just and non-discriminatory manner. If voting is as important as the INEC always claims it is, now is the time to show that Nigerian voters will be treated equally and fairly. The future of Nigeria's democracy depends on it.

"The INEC must not only be independent and impartial in the exercise of its constitutional and statutory responsibilities, but must also be seen to be independent and impartial.

"The public perception of the independence and impartiality of INEC is essential for building public confidence in the electoral process, and ensuring the cred-

ibility and legitimacy of the 2023 elections. Where Nigerians have doubts about the independence and impartiality of INEC, they are more likely to have less confidence in the electoral process thereby undermining democracy.

"Enforcing unrealistic voter registration deadline while extending the deadline for party primaries would deny and abridge the constitutional and international human rights of eligible voters including to equal treatment and equal protection,

and non-discrimination. "We would be grateful if the recommended measures are taken within 48 hours of the receipt and/or publication of this letter. If we have not heard from you by then, SERAP shall consider appropriate legal ac-tions to compel INEC to comply with our request in the public interest.

'The recommended extension would also bolster voter confidence in the electoral process, and the ability of INEC to discharge its constitutional and statutory responsibilities independently and impartially.

"Extending the deadline for voter registration would also be justified, given reports of challenges in the voter registration exercise, especially for young people, the elderly, persons living with disabilities, and those resident in states facing security challenges and living in internally displaced persons (IDP) camps.

"One of the people's most sacred rights is the right to vote. The commission has a

constitutional and statutory responsibility to ensure the effective exercise of the right of all eligible voters to participate

in their own government. "Extending the deadline for party primaries without providing adequate time and opportunity for eligible voters to register and participate in the 2023 general elections would amount to an unfair and discriminatory treatment of Nigerian voters, and violate other human rights.

"The will of the people is expressed through democratic elections. This requires that people should be afforded adequate time and opportunity to register to vote. Extending the voter registration deadline is crucial for promoting the independence and impartiality of INEC and building public confidence in the electoral process.

"SERAP therefore urges you and the commission to take immediate measures to encourage greater political participation by extending voter registration deadlines, and improving voters' education and engagement throughout the country. This would show the commitment of the commission to the principles of equal protection and nondiscrimination.

"The Nigerian Constitution 1999 (as amended) provides in Section 14(1)(c) that, 'the participation by the people in their government shall be ensured in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.' 'Section 9(6) of the Electoral Act 2022 provides that 'the registration of voters, updating and revision of the Register of Voters under this section shall not stop not later than 90 days before any election covered by this Act.'

"Similarly, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights, and the African Charter on Democracy, Elections and Governance guarantee the right to political participation.

"These human rights trea-ties also require states parties including Nigeria to ensure the independence and impartiality of national electoral bodies responsible for the management of elections, as well as to promote the establishment of the necessary conditions to foster citizen participation." "The right of people to par-

ticipate in their government is a fundamental feature of any democratic society, and any undue restriction of the right would strike at the heart of representative government. "According to our information,

the INEC recently extended the deadline for political party primaries. The commission also plans to end the ongoing Continuous Voter Registration (CVR) by 30 June 2022. The commission is also set to suspend online pre-registration by May 30 2022. "However, following the exten-

sion of the deadline for party primaries, and the fact that the INEC has declared 42 per cent of new voters' registration invalid, it is also fair and just for INEC to extend the deadlines for voter registration.

Sole proprietor to manage coconut refinery, says commissioner

Information and Strategy commissioner, Comrade Ini Ememobong, has disclosed that the Akwa Ibom State-owned coconut facility, known as St Gabriel Refinery, built by Governor Udom Emmanuel, would be managed under private enterprise system for optimal result. Ememobong explained that the governor as a financial expert has adopted sole proprietorship model so that the companies established under the state industrialization policy can in turn give dividends to government.

Speaking after a project tour of government owned industries in the state, the Commissioner who admitted that government is not a good business manager noted that Ibom Air as well as the Ibom Icon Hotels are privately run and are bringing a lot of dividends to the state. He said the process has injected life into the economy of the state adding that such would be replicated in the newly commissioned coconut refinery.

The Commissioner, in disabusing the mind of the public to the effect that the refinery will fail, affirmed that the company will be well managed under the proposed arrangement.

"There is no fear of how to properly manage those businesses as the governor has shown great example with the way Ibom Airlines is being run. Though owned by the government, it is run like a private enterprise. Same thing is applicable to Ibom Icon Hotel. The management and the board are dominated by private business people and every six months they come to the executive council meeting to give an update on their activities. The state is getting dividend from them," he said.

The Commissioner said the governor in an attempt to create jobs for the teeming youths engaged humans to perform some task which machines can perform in some of the industries noting that the refinery crushes about

one million nuts daily.

He said, "with mechanization introduced to industrialization, His Excellency consciously designed a human interface into it. Some things machines can handle, His Excellency employed the youths to be doing them so as to engage them. The principle of private sector is what we use in running all our endeavors. Level of equity in Ibom Air is purely government, fully owned by government but run privately, we don't have government interference unless where very necessary."

On Education, he noted that Governor Emmanuel in an attempt not to have distorted development in education declared an emergency in the sector where he convened

education summit that set up a think tank which came up with a ten year road map...He further noted that the state government made the road map non partisan such that members of the opposition party and other stakeholders in the education sectors were among the think tank that drew the ten year road map.

The Commissioner, who added that the governor has been consistent in the payment of WAEC fees which runs to the tune of over N800million, said the Akwa Ibom State University has full accreditation with a fully digitized studio for the Communications Department.

"All our schools of nursing and health technology before lost their accreditation but now have regained their accreditation, and are prepared to produce their graduate," he said.

Professor Soludo stated this at the Second Session of the Sixth Synod of Anglican Diocese of Aguata, held at St James' Church, Nanka, Orumba North Local Government Area on Sunday.

He said: "The last institution those causing mayhem in the state want to exterminate is the church, but they will not succeed.

"Despite scanty resources, we are determined to give ndi Anambra a state to be proud of," Soludo assured.

Prof Wole Soyinka has said that he called off his appearance at a school in Anambra State in protest over the brutal killing of pregnant Mrs. Harira Jibril and her four children by unknown gunmen recently.

Harira hailed from Adamawa State. Her remains and those of her four children have been buried in Awka, Anambra State capital.

The Nobel Laureate at the weekend made his position known in a statement titled, "Drawing the Red Line on

Infanticide."


Soyinka said the tragedy must be condemned and the culprits exposed to prevent a recurrence because the killings violate the touted values of the black race which forbid people from murdering their guests.

"The cold-blooded murder of guests in our home is however not merely a national issue but a violation of the much touted values of the black race," Soyinka wrote.

We must begin somewhere, "draw a line" - however individual and limited. I totally repudiate the killing of guests, of the unarmed, of innocents, the vulnerable, indeed, the murder of humanity."

Soyinka, who said he also thought of cancelling a similar engagement in Abuja last week after the gruesome murder of Deborah Samuel in Sokoto by Muslim fundamentalists but later changed his mind, said the decision was right this time, because the moment was compelling.

He added: "In empathy with those innocents whose scholastic careers have been so brutally annulled, I serve notice of cancellation of that engagement with the Anambra school, scheduled for August. The deaths of those innocents cannot be reversed, but we must begin, even vesterday, the process of reversing the mental trajectory that makes death from innocence the current norm of national existence."



The Nigerian military and many local wars

ince the return to democratic rule in 1999, Nigeria has witnessed different conflicts ranging from sectarian to ethno-religious crises, insurgency, hostage taking, arson, cattle rustlings, terrorism, large-scale kidnappings, pipeline vandalism, crude-oil theft, civil unrest, and ritual killings. In response to these challenges, the federal government, has continuously deployed the military on Internal Security Operations (ISOs). In effect, the Nigeria Army is fighting many local wars, thereby stretching the one hundred and fifty thousand army thin.

Section 217 of the 1999 Constitution states that the duties of the military will be to defend Nigeria from external aggression, maintain its territorial integrity, secure its borders on land, sea, air, suppress insurrection and act in aid of civil authorities to restore order when called upon to do so by the President, subject to such conditions as may be prescribed by an Act of the National Assembly. It is this last provision that has created a loophole for government to deploy the military to every IS challenge. This has made the military assume the position of the first line in internal security.

The regular engagements of the military on ISOs, which most times disregard the Military Internal Security précis, a document that is supposed to guide military engagement in internal security situations, have exposed the shortcomings of the military. These include personnel, training, equipment and logistics deficit, human rights abuses, and corruption. This has demystified the military.

Military orientation dictates that a potential threat is an enemy and as such should be eradicated. Having this type of mindset during internal operations could be dangerous. Defence against external aggression should be differentiated from operations against 'enemies' within. Some soldiers are of the opinion that they have a more-noble role than merely defusing tension. They think they have been called upon because of the incapacity and inefficiency of the Police in maintaining law and order. The result is that | the soldiers. This fact was also acknowledged the military usually take over operations from the Police instead of aiding the civil authorities as provided in the 1999 Constitution.

Since the primary function of the military is to defend the country in times of war, military training is usually based on inflicting maximum damage and destruction on their opponents and defeating them in the shortest possible time. Internal security operations only require restraint and the use of minimum force which contrasts with what is usually required of soldiers in conventional warfare. Minimum force is required because they are maintaining law and order among their own people.

The arbitrariness associated with the military while in internal security operations can be attributed to the kind of training undergone by

by the Former Chief of Army Staff, Lt-General Onyeabo Ihejirika acknowledged this fact when he said that the Nigerian Army must refocus its logistics training to cater for internal security operations in aid of civil authority.

The Nigerian military has been accused of excessive use of force in internal operations. Excessive force refers to a force that is above that which is reasonable, and a prudent law enforcement officer would use under normal circumstances. Then Borno State Governor Kashim Shettima, said in April 2013 that over 100 people were killed in Baga during a clash between officers of the Joint Task Force and insurgents. Residents of the village said they buried 185 people after the battle, while Red Cross said 187 people were killed (BBC News).

By convention, soldiers should not be seen all over the place. But there is a departure from this in situations where soldiers perform internal security operations. They extort citizens after intimidating them. It is common for civilians to be seen frog-jumping at check points. Women and girls are sometimes raped. Soldiers involved in internal security operations have also been accused of arbitrariness. For instance, in Jos, many young people were arrested and falsely accused of being masterminds of the death of some security personnel. The increasing role taken by the military in internal security operations has dire consequences on the national security architecture.

We recommend domestic legislation to regulate the military operations during internal operations. There should be a re-orientation of the soldiers involved in internal security operations. Soldiers should undergo training on internal security operations before engaging in same. Also, they need training to meet with the challenges of contemporary global threats.

The military is one of the most resilient national institutions. We must nourish it and ensure it does not imbibe the negative attributes of the Nigerian Police, which internal security operations expose them to.

Hon Francis Oborevwori: A new Sheriff coming to town

I the winning streak of PDP in Delta State elections from 1999 till date is summoned to predict the forthcoming general elections, Rt. Hon. So, early in the race, after the DC 23 announcement of the final three contestants, His Royal Majesty (Major General Mujakperuo, Orhue the 1st), the traditional ruler of Okpe people where Oborevwori is a chief, rolled out the pomp and pageantry of Okpe royalty, openly blessed and endorsed Oborevwori as a worthy representative of the Okpe people for the coveted seat of Governor of Delta State. Sheriff for Governor became a project of the Okpe people, 'our own Sheriff' as senior chiefs (I quote Chief Robert Onome) of the kingdom captured it.

But beyond this, Sheriff's victory is victory for Urhobo, victory for consensus-building and victory to the State. This ought to be a model to the country- how to manage cultural and ethnic diversity, how to manage a polity with fairness, equity, and justice. Very early in the race to winning the governorship slot, there were contestations on the status of rotation; that is, was rotation of the governorship slot among the three senatorial districts a convention, a gentleman's agreement; was it to be rotated among the ethnic group in the senatorial districts. Finally, reason prevailed and the received perception that it was the turn of the Urhobo to produce the governor won the day.

A congratulatory message to Chief Sheriff Francis Oborevwori is in order. From the rough and tumble of street life, he has managed himself well. To be able to manage the House of Assembly for six years without any form of rebellion showed that he enjoyed the confidence of his honourable colleagues and the State governor. Early in the year, some twenty-two honourable members of House endorsed him for governor. It is only a man who is wise in the techniques of survival that can navigate the rough waters of politics at that level. Obviously, his choice is a popular one within the PDP in the State. With the number of votes which he garnered from delegates during the primaries, it is obvious that the party has made a popular choice. To be sure, money was spent on delegates. Indeed, all contestants splashed money on delegates to win them over. Naira and dollar rain fell on delegates in the days before the primaries. No one who is familiar with elections in Nigeria will fault the governor for sticking out his neck in support of his anointed one!

Now that the primaries are over, it is time to plan for the general elections. PDP is well established in Delta State, with men and women of timber and caterpillar planted in the twenty-five LGs in the State. In every unit, every ward, and every Local government, PDP has men and women who have held some position in the twenty-three-year reign of the Party in the state. There are very few countries in the world that would qualify to be called nationstates. We have many nations in the world, but most of these are either balkanized among various states or they - many nations are grouped together to form a state. Nigeria is one of such. It is indeed acclaimed to have over 250 ethnic nationalities within her geopolitical space. Truly, there is nothing wrong with this reality. But it becomes a disaster if her leadership fails to consciously build the State into nationhood. Everything in Nigeria seems to be heading in the opposite direction where ethnic affiliation is paramount in the affairs of the State.

Whether consciously or otherwise, President Mohammadu Buhari led government policies affiliate strongly with the political philosophy of Ibn Khaldun. He was born in Tunisia on May 27, 1332 AD. This 14th-century



medieval Islamic philosopher was a historian of repute, an economist, jurist, traveller, and statesman. He is acclaimed to also be the father of sociology. Ibn Khaldun developed a socio-political theory of asabiyyah. This term means 'to bind'. It was a concept deployed by Ibn Khaldun, who originally set out to promote the 'spirit of kinship' in a tribe, and family. The word 'asabah' refers to male relations in a patrimony.

Politically however asabiyyah is the philosophy that stands for *groupdom*. How did Ibn Khaldun use this concept? For him there exist two disparate groups of political setup or societies. On one hand, we have the urban people. On the other hand, we have the rural people, called *Bedouin*. These are sedentary and nomadic people. Khaldun avers that the Bedouin are more courageous and brave people with military prowess due to the lot put on them by their

sedentary and nomadic lifestyle. Most importantly, they have a high measure or sense of asabiyyah among them. This spirit makes them naturally have an instinct to protect and defend themselves, especially their blood relatives from being attacked or humiliated by 'outsiders'. Asabiyyah promotes unity among them; imbuing in them that one of theirs cannot be wrong and must be defended and protected against the interest of the 'outsider.'

Khaldun nevertheless Ibn believes that urban settlers have a sense of asabiyyah, but one that has been weakened by the reality of the pleasures and comfort of the city life they enjoy. It is therefore very easy for the Bedouin to overrun them and impose their will and governance over them. But cautioned that once this is achieved the leaders of the new groupdom must do everything to promote the spirit of asabiyyah among the new elite, other another group with a higher spirit of asabiyyah would upset them.

A great parallel can be drawn with what is happening in Nigeria today. We are daily reading of people saying we seem to have two laws for citizens. People are perceived as born into inferior ethnic groups. They are secondclass Nigerians. What you may ask makes some traditional rulers first class and others of no class.

Why should the state use resources from the so-called classless ethnic nationalities to promote their own blood-stock? One fact is clear! The rest of us, are aliens in our State. We are under the control of a more dominant asabiyyah. While some were busy promoting and working assiduously towards a pan-Nigerian Nation, some were assiduously strengthening the spirit of kinship, and blood ties among themselves. Today, only a few own all the oil well; individuals - not Nigeria - control the oil business. The way the minority is now is no different from being in unpronounced captivity.

One obvious result that follows any society run on this medieval philosophy is ruin. This is a philosophy built upon the sociology of hate of "others" and advises its own to steal states and empires built by others. They build no empires where the people prosper. They believe prosperity is for their elite class and blood relation. Like the Lords in feudalism, others are seen as serfs and pauperized. Since they do not know the origin of the rise of kingdoms they find it difficult to know how to make the kingdoms they have 'stolen' grow, develop and prosper. Bad governance ruins a people. This is the lot of the Nigerian State.

When Chinua Achebe titled his book, There was a Country, he was clearly referring to the

fact of the loss of the Nigerian State. Today, many of our youth desire to relocate. Many of our elite have their families outside Nigeria. Nigeria is vault from where they loot ceaselessly in order to guarantee their family members abroad comfort and the common good that Nigeria under their watch cannot offer. Who steals his own property? That some people can steal this country to death shows that Nigeria does not belong to them. The time is nigh for us to seek Nigeria before it is late. Asabiyyah can only galvanize other ethnic nationalities into a new consciousness that will bleed Nigeria to death. Nigeria is not older than any ethnic nationality. These would remain. They are more permanent entities, they may choose to realign for a better existence as human beings. That we are becoming ethnicized daily is becoming worrisome. People are tactically relocating their businesses, families, and selves to areas they feel are their 'home' even within Nigeria. The State is carefree about the alienated. But the State forgets that freedom from alienation cannot be stopped and impeded. This State called Nigeria needs a renaissance!

Fallouts from PDP presidential primary election

The presidential primary poll of the Peoples Democratic Party (PFP) has been won and lost with Atiku Abubakar emerging its candidate for the 2023 election. Politics Editor **TUNDE JOSHUA** examines intrigues that played out during the exercise as well as frills and side attractions that characterised it. **Excerpts**.

Bas the 2019 standard bearer of the Peoples Democratic Party, Alhaji Atiku Abubakar, again picked its ticket for 2023.

His victory, however, did not come on a platter of gold and not without a price. The first runner- up in the contest, Nyesom Wike who scored 237 votes as against Atiku's 371 actually gave him a run for his money and fame as a veteran in the presidential race.

Opposition to his aspiration and those of other northern aspirants at the very beginning of the contest was spontaneous with a renewed calls that PDP should stick to an assumed power rotation or otherwise known as zoning.

Agitation for an Igbo President was strong on the pretext that the South East has never produced a president, hence the influx of politicians of Igbo extractions venturing into the race by picking PDP's N40 million express of interest and nomination forms.

Leaders of thought in the entire south and middle belt backed the call for South East president, PDP Governors Forum tested on both their Asaba and Lagos declaration to mount insistence on southern president in 2023 and even South East caucus of the PDP Governors Forum toed the line of Igbo presidency.

Aspirants from that South East who bought PDP presidential forms include; former Anambra State governor, Peter Obi, former Senate President, Anyim Pius Anyim, a renowned pharmacist, , Mazi Sam Ohuambuwa, American based medical doctor, Nwachukwu Anakwenze, former Speaker of Abia State Assembly, Rt. Hon. Chikwendu Kalu and Chief. Ugwu Charles Okwudili.

Infact, attempts were made by southeast aspirants to produce a consensus candidate but if failed. They all approached the race on individual strength.

A new twist to the call for southern presidency was introduced by Governor Nyesom Wike's aspiration, followed by Governor Udom Emmanuel, from the south south zone.

With the refusal by the party to zone the ticket, the contest became an all comers affairs as former Ekiti governor, Ayodele Fayose from the South West and publisher, Dele Momodu from Edo State joined.

Leading northern aspirants such as former Senate President, Bukol Saraki, Sokoto State governor, Aminu Tambuwal, Bauchi governor, Bala Mohammed and seasoned economist, Mohammed Hayatu - Deen joined forces to produce a northern consensus candidate with the exclusion of Atiku who refused to join the parley. Eventually, the consensus drive hit the rock.

Lessons to be learnt from the outcome of the PDP primaries include; Ability of the North to speak with

one voice

In stout defence of the reason why



the north should participate in the contest for PDP ticket, the north were united in their claims that the party's constitution was not specific on zoning as principle of power sharing.

Atiku was reminded of his previous stand on zoning but the north in unison reminded their antagonists that it is expected of the PDP to produce and field s northern candidate after former president Goodluck Jonathan, a southerner.

The northern conspiracy theory also include the excuse that PDP should rather focus on competence and not geopolitical leaning in chosing it's flag bearer. Tambuwal, Bala Mohammed, Atiku, Saraki, Hayatu - Deen, all canvassed this position at different fora during their consultation tours across the country.

Few hours to the Satuday's convention, northern leaders of the party in a last minute horse trading settled for Atiku and implored others to support him. They believed that a combined strength of northern aspirants is what was needed to stave off threats by Wike.

Though Saraki and Bala Mohammed refused this position, Tambuwal stepped down for Atiku few minutes to commencement of voting and it yielded results as delegates from Sokoto and his North West support based cast their votes for Atiku.

The Southern Hypocrisy

Voting pattern at the primary clearly showed the hypocrisy of calls for Igbo presidency. Given the fact that Peter Obi left the PDP few days before the convention and Anakwenze's withdrawal on the morning of the primary, votes recorded by the south east aspirants who went into the contest does not show the readiness of Igbo for presidency.

The leading Igbo aspirant in the race, Pius Anyim scored just 14 votes in an election where Abia State has 17 delegates, Enugu 16 delegates, Anambra 21delegates, though 20 voted, Imo 24 delegates and Ebonyi 13 delegates.

Another aspirant from the zone, Sam Ohuambuwa scored just a vote while both Kalu and Okwudili recorded no vote at all.

Finding by The Trumpet revealed that south east delegates gave their votes to either Atiku or Wike. Governors of Abia and Enugu are die- hard followers of Atiku while delegates from states without PDP governor were influenced by the dollar power of Wike to deny fellow Ndigbo chances to win.the primary.

It sound absurd that Fayose did not score a single vote in an election where Ekiti State has 16 delegates. All the 16 votes went to Wike who it was learnt sponsored the former governor in the race.

This put to question, the seriousness of the agitation for Igbo presidency.

Fluke agitation for Women Empower-

ment in politics

Women politicians, wife of political office holders and feminist activists have cried up to the high heavens on the need to accord women concession in political powers. But the voting pattern of the few women delegates at the convention showed that agitators still have a lot of enlightenment to do to change mindsets of women not to sell women opportunities for money.

The only female aspirant, Tariela Diana Olivier scored just a vote in an election that about 50 women delegates participated.

Others have voted according to the direction of the governors and leaders while others submitted to monetary gains.

Fake ethnic chauvinism

At the convention, it was discovered that ethnic agitation in some quarters is just fake campaign.

With the level of stigmatization of the Fulani tribe due to happenings in the country, one would expect that southern aspirants like Wike , Emmanuel, Anyim and the rest will carry the day but it goes to Atiku, a Fulani man from Adamawa State.

Atiku's vote cut across the Yorubaland, Igboland and the South South apart from the northern states while Saraki and Wike got votes outside their geopolitical zones.

This attest to the fact that Nigerian politics has gone beyond tribal, ethnic or religious sentiments .

"The outcome of the primaries will best be described as no victor no vanquished, as all the aspirants gave a good account of themselves and congratulated each other for a good contest" he said.



'Why EFCC stormed venue of PDP presidential primary poll'

• conomic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) has said its operatives stormed the presidential primary election of the major opposition Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) at Moshood Kashimawo Abiola National Stadium in Abuja to monitor alleged delegates inducement and financial malpractices.

The agency's Public Relations Officer, Wilson Uwujaren, disclosed this to newsmen at the weekend, stressing that the anti-graft agency was determined to curb corruption.

He said: "Our operatives are at the ongoing PDP presidential primary elections at the MKO Abiola Stadium to monitor the exercise, and most especially, to check delegates inducement and other financial malpractice."

Operatives of the EFCC had stormed the venue of the PDP's presidential primary election held on Friday and Saturday in Abuja following reports of alleged vote buying and bribing of delegates at the event.

Some of the officers were seen searching

'Ghana must go' bags at the venue in a bid to find cash arranged by politicians to buy votes and induce delegates during the exercise.

Meanwhile, some delegates have said anti-graft agencies lack evidence to prosecute them despite being induced with huge amounts of money.

In Kano, an anonymous delegate insisted that there was nothing wrong in collecting cash from aspirants, describing the money as "chicken change" that will not last.

"It is just our time to smile after a very long period. Whoever is asking for our prosecution is certainly not privileged to be in our shoes because I doubt if there's one person in Nigeria that will not collect," he said.

He added that contrary to what people believe, many delegates don't receive the huge amount of money being called out in the media because of middlemen, except in situations where they are lucky enough to receive the money directly from the aspirant.

An APC delegate who spoke anonymously, described the largesse as their 'share', which had been budgeted for by all the aspirants.

They both said the EFCC and the Independent Corrupt Practices Commission (ICPC) had no proof that they were bribed and so could not prosecute them.

Another delegate of the APC in another state said it was to evade prosecution that campaign funds were not paid into bank accounts, which he said could be traceable.

"Who can prove that they gave us money?" he asked, adding that the EFCC or ICPC would have a hard time proving that delegates collected money from aspirants.

A PDP delegate in Borno State said the process of sharing money might not be easy to be tracked by anti-graft agencies.

He said, "I don't have any fear of being tracked down because I did not receive any document or evidence of payment from the aspirants. I am not afraid of anything because delegates' election is just like business, the highest bidder gets the result. And I will vote for the one who gives me the highest amount, or the aspirant of my political mentor.'

ICPC, FRSC hold capacity building for operatives on joint operations

In a continued bid to deepen their collaboration, the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), and the Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) recently held a capacity training for their operatives.

He expressed hope that the outcome of the training would contribute to the building of sustainable foundations for the reduction

Owasanoye SAN, who declared the training open, charged law enforcement agencies to ensure that bad eggs were removed from the system to stop them from corrupting others and damaging the reputation of the leadership.

Owasanoye expressed concern over the continued poor rating of the country as a result of the level of retail corruption happening on daily basis which affect the lives of ordinary people.

He further stated that the Commission was willing to partner with agencies to enable them succeed in the fight against corruption in Nigeria.

On her part, the Head of Special Duties Division of ICPC, Mrs Vera Esidene, said the training was born out of the collaborative effort and synergy between the two agencies following successful operations carried out in the past.

She expressed belief that operatives would be better placed to perform effectively in future joint operations after the training.

Adamawa JSC sacks 11, demotes judge, 20 others over fake certificates

Chidoka accuses academics of fostering electoral process graft

Says he was denied chance of emerging PDP national delegate

A former Corps Marshal of the Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC), Osita Chidoka, has expressed concerns on the role of academics in Nigeria's electoral process, saying that corruption was being promoted.

Chidoka, who is a member of the electoral sub-committee for the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) 2022 convention, accused an academician (name withheld) of scheming him out as a national delegate of the party.

The former Corps Marshal said that he watched the PDP convention which was held on Friday and Saturday from his house, for the first time in many years due to corruption in the process of selecting the delegates.

He said: "On May 10th, a National Delegate Congress Committee.. to conduct the congress, but did not conduct any congress in Idemili North LGA, where I had bought form to contest as a national delegate.

"Strangely, the committee submitted a report and a fake result for Idemili North LGA with the name of someone that did not purchase the form for the congress."

Chidoka said INEC's report on the matter stated its officials did not observe any election in Idemili North LGA as they were at the venue till 7pm.

According to him, a petition was submitted to the party with a certified copy of the INEC report by him, and then requested the party to reschedule and conduct the congress in line with the party's rules and Electoral Act. "I waited till Friday 27th May for the party NWC to sit on the petition, to no avail. Instead, the party went ahead and published the name from the fake result as the National Delegate.

"As a loyal party member who have remained a dedicated and prominent voice of the party since the party went into opposition, I have elected to stay away from the convention and will not pursue a legal redress against the party that I have given so much at grave personal risk and cost," he said.

AfDB tasks Africa on agric transformation

irector of Agriculture and Agro-industry at the Africa Development Bank (AfDB), Dr. Martin Fregene, has tasked governments of African countries on agricultural, structural transformation and increased financing to mitigate food challenges on the continent.

Fregene stated this at a virtual forum of Technologies for African Agricultural Transformation (TAAT), the second edition of the AfDB's flagship programme, which held at the weekend.

He said Africa had received some incredible impacts from external shocks for its good supply from the COVID-19 pandemic and the Russia and

Ukraine crisis.

He said: "Africa is having a shortfall of 30 million tons of cereal, mostly wheat and maize due to the war in Ukraine.

"Why don't we do the structural transformation required to make our agriculture market-led in the sense that it's the market that provided farmers inputs, often taken from the farmers and ensures they get extension services where they use the best technologies needed for production like the rest of the world.

"There is a huge market in Africa for cereals for food. The market can handle everything about mechanisation, production and finance," he said. The AfDB senior official

stated that to get the private

sector involved, four things should be put in place, including changes in certified seeds required regulation, increased finance, improved infrastructure and faster method of registering new varieties, inputs and technologies.

"We must have a seed council that would test certified seeds for purity and germination. So, we need to strengthen the seeds system and national regulatory agencies. We don't only need the relevant laws, but also strong enforcement to ensure that only certified seeds are sold and this will encourage the private sector to key in.

"Also, on fertilisers, of six brands sampled in Nigeria, only one had the required nutrients, which is the NPIC 12: 12: 17 quality and as such control has to be enforced," he stressed. Speaking further, Fregene said: "Not just that we must ensure that fertiliser becomes a strategic commodity, but the demurrage for rice and wheat that are given priority at the ports should be reduced before

they are offloaded.' In his presentation, Head, TAAT Clearing House, Dr. Innocent Musabyimna, explained that TAAT programme connects innovative agricultural technologies from research institutes to private sector partners for adoption and scaling.

"This is one of the mechanisms we are using to transform agriculture across the continent. We are bringing all the technologies that are proven, ready to be used into the hands of millions of farmers for deploying," he stated.

Musabyimana noted that TAAT has been implemented in 28 countries of the continent with 160 proven, high-performing technologies by partnering governments, private sector and farmers.

•Prices of essential items surged higher in S'East, S'South

Food prices increased by 44.3% in last 12 months-*NBS*

The National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) has declared that the prices of selected food items have increased in the last 12 months.

This is according to the NBS selected food price watch report for April 2022 released in Abuja at the weekend.

The report showed that the average price of 1kg of beans rose on a year-on-year basis by 44.32 per cent from N359.64 in April 2021 to N519. 05 in April 2022.

Also, the prices increased on a month-on-basis by 2.59 per cent to N505.94 in March 2022.

The report revealed that the average price of a 500kg sliced bread increased on a year-onyear basis by 35.31 per cent from N332.95 in April 2021 to N405.51 in April 2022.

"On a month-on-month basis, the average price of the items increased by 0.61 per cent in April 2022," the statement added.

Similarly, it said the average price of 1kg tuber of yam on a year-on-year basis rose by 42.88 per cent from the value recorded in April 2021 at N252.80 to N361.20 in April this year.

It said month-on-month basis, it increased from N353.56 in March 2022 indicating 2.6 per cent growth.

In the same vein, the report

revealed that the average price of a bottle of palm oil increased by 45.59 per cent from N578.86 in April 2022, rising by 0.06 per cent on a month-on-month basis.

The report indicated that the average price 1kg unripe plantain rose by 38.66 per cent on a year-on-year basis from N243.37 in April 2021 to N337.37 in April 2022.

It added that the average price of a bottle of vegetable oil stood at N1,007.68 in April 2022, an increase of 46,21per cent from N689.19 in April last year.

On a month-on-month basis, it rose by 1.31 per cent from N994 .62 in March 2022.

The report also disclosed that at the state level, Ebonyi recorded the highest average increase in the price of beans, as a module was sold for N8,757, while Borno State reported the least price adjustment in beans at N565.67.

It said the highest average price of 500kg sliced bread was recorded in Ebonyi at N650.0, while the lowest was recorded in Borno at N262.38.

The report showed that Akwa-Ibom recorded the highest price increase of 1kg tuber of yam at N695.93, while Bauchi recorded the lowest at N133.28.

Analysis by zone showed that the South East recorded the highest average price of beans, as it was sold for N831.09 followed by the South-South at N676.13, while the North East recorded the least at N307.21.

Similarly, the South East recorded the highest average price increment of sliced bread at N500 and N601.09 followed by the South-South at N550.2 1, while the lowest was recorded in the North East at N279.51.

The report also showed that the average price of 1kg of yam was higher in the South West and the South-South at N528.78 and N495.02, while the North East recorded the lowest at N142.79.

Manufacturing sector grew in second half of 2021, says MAN

• Production value hit N7tr in 2021 as against previous year's N4.4tr

The Manufacturers Association of Nigeria (MAN) has declared that the country's manufacturing sector grew in several indices during the second half of 2021 compared to the preceding year. It made this known in a

statement issued at the weekend by President of the association, Mansur Ahmed, and available to The Trumpet in Lagos.

A MAN report revealed that the manufacturing sector production increased to N3.73 trillion in the second half of 2021 from N2.36 trillion in the corresponding half of 2020 indicating an increase of N1.37 trillion or 58.1 per cent rise.

It also showed that the sector increased by N0.07 trillion or 1.9 per cent, when compared with N3.66 trillion recorded in the preceding half, while production value in the sector amounted to

N7.03 trillion in 2021 compared to N4.42 trillion in 2020.

"The increase in the manufacturing production value in the second half of 2021 was associated with increased cement production due to the new BUA Cement Factory in Sokoto, the new factory of African Glass and activities of the five new paper mills.

This is also highlighted by the increased production value in the non-metallic mineral production sector to N374.41 billion in the second half of 2021 from N74.18 billion and N249.79 billion recorded in the corresponding half of 2020 and the preceding half," the statement reads.

The report further showed that capacity utilisation in the manufacturing sector increased to 59 per cent in the second half of 2021 from 53.7 per cent recorded in the corresponding half of 2020, indicating 5.3 per cent increase over the period.

It added that investments in the manufacturing sector increased to N73.18 billion from N56.44 billion recorded in the corresponding half of 2020, indicating N16.74 billion or 29.7 per cent increase over the period.

The statement noted that activities of the sector increased by N70.96 billion or 49.3 per cent when compared with N144.14 billion recorded in the preceding half with manufacturing investments amounting to N217.22 billion in 2021 as against N118.52 billion in 2020.

"Investments in manufacturing have been gradually recovering following the return of economic activities, as issues of COVID-19 pandemic were continuously resolved.

First Bank regains leadership position, grows profit by 65% to N151b

rist Bank of Nigeria (FBN) Holding Plc has reported a 65.4 per cent growth in its Profit After Tax (PAT) from N75.6 billion to N151.079 billion, while Profit Before Tax (PBT) doubled by 99.1 per cent to N166.66 billion in 2021 as against N83.7 billion in 2020.

The group's audited report indicated an impressive doubledigit growth as top and bottom line gross earnings rose from N590.66 billion in 2020 to N757.30 billion in 2021.

Investors commended FBN's performance when the bank released its 2021 financial statements, especially of its banking subsidiary, First Bank of Nigeria Limited, said to be indicative of its strong recovery from its dwindling financial position.

Reacting to the report, banking and capital market analysts said the impressive results signposted a regime of strong fundamentals after a period of restructuring by the board and management.

To mitigate the effects of low interest rate on investment securities and revenue generation, the bank intensified deposits mobilisation and funding strategy to support and enhance loan growth at optimised rates leading to a 5.7 per cent increase in interest expenses to N140.8 billion as against N133.2 billion in December 2020.

During the period, noninterest revenue grew by 96.1 per cent to N364.6 billion as

against N185.9 billion in the preceding year, on the back of increased fees and commissions on income, treasury activities and other operating income.

The FBN report showed that in its bid to further enhance its revenue generation capacity, First Pension Custodian Limited, a subsidiary of First Bank of Nigeria Limited entered into an agreement with Access Bank Plc for a planned acquisition of the share capital of Access Pension Fund Custodian Limited held by Access Bank Plc.

Management of the bank maintained that the move would further boost its market share in the industry, aid revenue

diversification and support annuity income.

"Our investment in agent banking, digitisation platforms, which our customers have adopted for improved customer penetration and deepened our solid retail franchise.

"This continues to provide us access to stable funding, reducing our cost of funds ratio to 2.1 per cent as of December 2020, while supporting the interest of our current and savings account at 91.2 per cent," a statement issued by the bank read.

Also, total assets grew by 16.2 per cent year-on-year to N8.9 trillion in 2020 driven by 30.0 per cent year-on-year investment securities.

Cash and balance with the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN), loans to banks, customers and investment securities constitute 87.2 per cent of total assets as of December 2020.

"With a cleaner balance sheet

and resilient earning-generating

capacity, First Bank Nigeria Limited was able accelerate capital buffers from organic earnings, hence despite the increase in loans and advances, Capital Adequacy Ratio (CAR) remained steady marginally and increasing to 17.4 per cent in December 2021," the report added.

FG approves Elon Musk's Starlink in Nigeria

World's richest man, Elon Musk, at the weekend, announced on Tweeter that Nigeria and Mozambique have approved Starlink, the satellite Internet service launched by SpaceX, his space exploration company.

This is coming three days after Musk responded to a tweet on the service launch in Africa.

"Yes, the first countries in Africa will be announced soon. Starlink will serve everywhere on earth where we are legally allowed to serve," he tweeted.

Starlink operates in over 30 countries where it is legally approved, in essence, where it has required licences to provide Internet services.

Its launch in Africa, particularly in Nigeria, has been in the works since 2021. In May last year, SpaceX sent some representatives to the Nigeria **Communications Commission** (NCC), the country's telecommunications regulator, to discuss the possibility of obtaining a license to operate Starlink in Nigeria.

Reports from the NCC indicated that the telecommunications industry regulator approved the license, which corroborated Musk's confirmation on Tweeter.

The publication also said the license for Starlink Internet Services Nigeria Limited, its trading name, was obtained under the Internet Service Provider (ISP) category, while other service providers such as telcos and private operators fall within the category too and will last for a decade starting from May 2022.

Starlink will bring competitiveness to the Nigerian telecommunication operators such as MTN and Airtel, which have had to compete against each other without improving their Internet quality and other services.

However, one argument against Starlink is that its services are expensive at \$110 (N60,500) for preorder, while its monthly price at \$599 (N330,000) for a full kit, including a terminal, mounting tripod and Wi-Fi router, are costly for the average Nigerian and Mozambique user.

Also, its premium service costs about \$2,500, an equivalent of N1.375 million for the full kit

NCS removes imported goods from export prohibition list

The Nigeria Customs Service (NCS) has said that all imported goods have been excluded from the export prohibition list and that all previously imported goods can now be re-exported upon payment of 2.5 per cent export surcharge of the present value, subject to approval of the Federal Ministry of Finance.

This is contained in circular dated April 25, 2022, signed by the Acting Assistant Comptroller General of Customs (ÅCG)

Nasir Ahmed.

According to the management of the NCS, President Muhammadu Buhari recently approved the 2022 Fiscal policy measures for implementation with effect from April 25, 2022.

The circular, which was addressed to all Area Comptrollers of Federal Operations Units (FOUs) and all unit heads, reads in part: "I am directed to forward the Federal Ministry

the President's approval for the implementation of 2022 Fiscal Policy measures with effect from April 25, 2022.

The Fiscal Policy comprises supplementary protection measures for the implementation of the Economic Community of West African States' (ECOWAS) Common External Tariff (CET) 2022-2026 and Excise duties on non- alcoholic, alcoholic beverages, cigarettes and other tobacco products, as well as telecommunication services.

The policy also removed all imported goods from the export prohibition list and as such, all previously imported goods can now be exported upon payment of 2.5 per cent export surcharge of the present value subject to approval of the ministry.

'Note that a 90-day grace period commencing from the implementation of this circular has been granted to all importers, who had opened Forms 'M' and entered into irrevocable trade agreement.

"They shall be allowed to process and clear their goods at the prevailing duty rates until June 30, 2022," the circular stated.

MMPN flays murder of woman, kids

"They were coming back home after she visited her sister who was living in the nearby town. She and the four children were all wearing hijabs; that was why the gunmen targeted them," he said.

SP Hundeyin gave the name of the suspects as Korede Saheed and Yahaya Faisal. He stated that luck ran against the suspects when their victims quickly reached out to the Rapid Response Squad (RRS) officers on patrol in the area.

The PRO further disclosed that a Samsung Galaxy S8 and iPhone 12 were recovered from the suspects.

He said, "Officers of the Rapid Response Squad (RRS) have arrested two suspected traffic robbers in separate incidents between Magodo Estate and Otedola bridge,

Lagos State.

"One suspect, Korede Saheed (29) was arrested on Thursday night, while the other suspect, Yahaya Faisal (22), was arrested on Friday night.

"Luck ran out on the suspects when their victims quickly reached out to RRS officers on patrol in the area.

"The officers immediately arrested them and recovered one Samsung Galaxy S8 and one iPhone 12 from the suspects.

"Yahaya who was also found with different ATM cards confessed to the police that his gang robbed in traffic between Ojodu-Berger and Otedola Bridge."

According to him, the Lagos State Commissioner of Police, CP Abiodun Alabi, has directed the Commander RRS, CSP Olayinka Egbeyemi, to transfer the suspects and exhibit to the CP's Special squad for further investigation that would lead to the arrest of other fleeing gang members and their eventual prosecution.

Rivers State Police Command has confirmed the death of about 31 persons in a stampede during an outreach programme organised by a new generation church, Kings Assembly, on Saturday in Port Harcourt.

It was gathered that at the programme tagged, "Shop for Free', which was scheduled to begin on Saturday morning, the church expected to offer free food items to attendees, the less privileges.

However, there was a crowd at the venue of the event. The movement of the crowd resulted in a stampede, which led to the death of the 31 victims.

Confirming the incident, the acting Police Public Relations Officer (PPRO) of the command, Grace Iringe-Koko said the church, located in GRA in the state capital, had invited members of the public to an an event where it would share some gift items to its members, including food stuffs.

She said that the event was held at the Port Harcourt Polo Club, a bigger facility to accommodate the anticipated crowd, including the underprivileged.

The PPRO further disclosed that the stamped occurred when the people who had gathered struggled to force their way into the arena, resulting in the death of the 31 persons.

She said, "There was a stampede in the said church and 31 persons were confirmed dead at the military hospital.

"Everywhere is calm for now and there is peace. Investigation is ongoing.'

Meanwhile, the church programme is an annual event to provide for the vulnerable in the society.

It was, however, not clear if the church made provisions or arrangements for crowd control measures or for medical emergencies.

According to a message announcing the programme on the church's website, household items, furniture, shoes, food items, among others, were available for distribution to attendees.

"For many, it is tough to get through each day. The economy and the state of the nation has kept many out of job and left others with little or nothing to cater for themselves or their loved ones. Hope seems like a fluke and living a struggle.

"It is to this end that we host our annual event - 'Shop for Free', where we put God's love into action and reach out to those in our immediate community with encouragement to keep hope alive.

"From foodstuff to household items, furniture and supplies, clothes, shoes and sundry items for adults and kids, there is no limit to the gift items that are given out during this event.

Suspects held for cybercrime in Bauchi

Bauchi State Police Command has arrested five suspects for alleged cybercrime popularly known as 'Yahoo Yahoo.' They were said to be undergoing training.

According to a statement signed by the Police Public Relations Officer of the Command, SP Mohammed Ahmed Wakil, the suspects were arrested after the police acted on verified intelligence.

Wakil gave the names of the suspects as Emmanuel Saleh (ringleader), Matthias Akronyi, Patience Nuhu, Bulus Haruna, and Kingsley Simon.

He said, "The Operatives of the State Intelligence Bureau (SIB), Bauchi Command acted on a verified intelligence on 20th May 2022, burst into an apartment located at Kirfi Road, GRA, Bauchi, where a training centre was established for youths who want to venture into internet crime (yahoo-yahoo) by one Emmanuel Saleh alias Wizblaq, 22 yrs old 'm' of Rafin-Zurfi, Bauchi."

The Police Spokesman also dis-

closed that findings revealed that the principal suspect, Emmanuel Saleh and members of the syndicate targeted foreign women under a proxy server, hacked by spoofing the victim's email account/website which makes it possible to carry out variations in the legitimate email of the victims to fool the victim and gain access to the accounts, calendar and data.

Wakil said during the investigation, the suspects confessed to the crime.

"The suspects arrested in the evotic apartment are Emmanuel Saleh alias Wizblaq (the ringleader), Matthias Akronyi alias Mad Kid, 20 yrs 'm' of Block 24, 82 Division's Army Barracks, Enugu, Patience Nuhu, 21yrs (female) of Rafin-Zurfi, Bauchi, Bulus Haruna, 18 yrs old 'm' of Rafin-Zurfi, Bauchi and Kingsley Simon, 19 yrs old 'm' of Rafin-Zurfi, Bauchi," he said.

Wakil said that that the proceeds of crime items recovered from the residential apartment turned training centre as exhibits include four laptops, one television set, four sound systems,

brand new power generator, seven plastic chairs, one office chair, musical keyboard and fridge.

"The Commissioner of Police directed that the suspects be charged to court as soon as the investigation is concluded.

"He advised the citizens of Bauchi State to take note of the precautions to mitigate against cybercrime to include, being careful of the information shared online (e.g pet names, date of birth, etc).

"Don't click on anything in an unsolicited email/SMS asking to update or verify your account information, carefully examine the email address, URL, and spelling used in any correspondence, Set up two factors (or multi-factor) authentication on any account that allows it and be careful what you download.

"Never open an email attachment from someone you don't know and to verify payment and purchase requests in person, if possible; or by calling the person to make sure it is legitimate," he added.

In what was the first match of Coach José Peseiro as Head Coach of the Super Eagles, largely under-strength а squad fought courageously and commendably against CONCACAF's perennial champions Mexico in an entertaining game that ended 2-1 at the iconic AT&T Stadium in Dallas on Saturday night.

Missing so many first-team players including Captain Ahmed Musa and being the first time they were coming together for any session since the disappointment of the 2022 FIFA World Cup ticket miss, the three-time African champions were projected to be sitting ducks for the Mexicans to roast in the State of Texas - a jurisdiction that shares a border with Mexico and where Mexico's lingua franca, Spanish is taught in schools as a second language.

The El Tri, dainty, cohesive, coherent and egged on by over 52,000 roaring spectators in the largest covered arena in the world, bossed the opening minutes with their crisp passes, awesome positional and nonchalant play telepathy. In this pulsating period, they were able to

However, the Eagles, while searching for a winner, conceded an unfortuitous own goal in the 56th minute, as Ekong swept into his own while trying to clear the ball from danger.

Home-based professionals Sani Faisal, Victor Mbaoma, Chiamaka Madu and Ishaq Kayode who came in after the first 45 minutes, also gave a good account of themselves.

"I am happy with what we put up out there. It was the first time after the disappointment of the World Cup playoff and you can say this is a makeshift team, while Mexico had their full-strength squad out there. I like what I saw today and I have confidence that we have appointed the right coach that can restore the glory of the Super Eagles and make them start winning once more," President of the NFF and FIFA Council Member, Amaju Pinnick, said after the game.

Nigeria had eight shots on goal compared to Mexico's 12, while Uzoho made four saves as against Cota's one.

The Eagles are scheduled to fly to New Jersey on Sunday morning, ahead of Thursday's clash with Ecuador at the Red Bull Arena in Harrison.

Disallowed Benzema's goal: John Terry faults VAR's call

disallowed Benzema's goal in the UEFA Champions League final, on Saturday, has continued to stir up controversies among the football community with former Chelsea captain John Terry faulting the VAR's decision.

The incident which would have resulted in Real Madrid taking the lead in the nick of time before referee Clement Turpin drew the curtain on first-half, prompted the former Three Lions' defender to carpet the rule as senseless.

Terry, who was allegedly highly infuriated with the outcome relatively to his tweet, claimed the fact that the ball came off a Liverpool player's touch proves that it was supposedly a goal.

"How is that not a goal?" Terry tweeted to express his displeasure over the decision.

Terry in his comment also mocked Peter Walton who analysed the incident after the first half and concluded Benzema was offside.

"I'm glad Peter Walton cleared it up for us," Terry mocked the English former professional football referee. He added: "The rule

clearly doesn't make sense because when would a player Liverpool ever intentionally play Benzema the ball?

"The fact it's come off a Liverpool player surely means it's a goal," Terry claimed.

Meanwhile, Peter Walton says the Real Madrid striker was offside when he scored

against Liverpool just before the close of first half.

Walton, who retired in 2012 after spending nine vears as a centre referee in the English Premier League, supported VAR's decision as rightly done.

He explained that the ball got to Benzema, who was already in an offside position, through an indeliberately deflected pass from Fabinho.

He added that if the ball was deliberately passed by Fabinho to Benzema, then the French striker would have been played onside.

"It's actually an easy one. Benzema is in an offside position - the offence is committed if the ball comes back to him," Walton said on BT Sport Studio.

"The ball deflects off Fabinho. Because of that, is offside. If Benzema Fabinho deliberately played the ball, he is onside. However, it is a deflection, so he is offside," he added.

The Trumpet reports that John Terry, who retired from Aston Villa in 2018, after having a great spell at Chelsea where he grew through the youth rank, scored a total of 42 career goals in 530 professional appearances.

Nadal, *3*5, had scheduled the thirdround tie with the Dutch after he defeated French Corentin Moutet 6-3 6-1 6-4 in the second round of the Grand slam event

at Philippe-Chatrier. Following the above, the 13 times French Open champion replicated the same feat against Botic van de Zandschulp at Court Suzanne Lenglen to cart home a 6-3 6-2 6-4 victory, which propels him closer to a quarterfinal clash with the top seed and defending champion, Novak Djokovic.

Meanwhile, Italian Open champion, Novak Djokovic saw off Aljax Bedene to a stunning defeat in the third round to book a round of 16 clash with world number 16 Diego Sebastián Schwartzman.

The 34-year-old Serbian whose first championship victory in his turbulent 2022 tennis campaign was at the Italian Open, won straight sets 6-3 6-3 6-2 at Philippe-Chatrier to displace the world number 195 Slovenian.

Both Nadal and Djokovic have been in perfect form at the French Open and edge closer to their unavoidable quarter-final showdown in Roland Garros.

The Spaniard, in the round of 16, is scheduled to face Canadian Felix Auger Aliassime who is ranked 150 in the world. A win for Nadal sets him up with the defending champion and world number one, Novak Djokovic, who defeated him at the 2021 French Open championship in the semi-final.

The erstwhile governor is not new to anti-graft law enforcement actions. Last year, he was repeatedly held and questioned by the EFCC over allegations that he criminally diverted billions in Zamfara's funds kept in a bank.

Missing plane with 22 persons causes anxiety

A passenger plane with 22 passengers on board went missing in Nepal, weekend as poor weather hampered a search operation, the airline and its officials said.

The Twin Otter Aircraft operated by Tara Air took off from the western town of Pokhara for Jomsom at 9:55a.m., but air traffic control lost contact after 15 minutes after take-off.

Spokesman for Tara Air, Sudarshan Bartaula, told AFP that: "We are trying to locate the possible area where the aircraft might be. Search and rescue teams from the police and army are heading towards the direction of the crash."

He said there were 19 passengers on board and

three crew members. The passengers included two Germans and four Indians, with the remainder Nepali.

Jomsom, a popular trekking destination in the Himalayas, takes about 20 minutes by plane from Pokhara, which lies 200 kilometres (120 miles) west of the capital, Kathmandu.

Spokesman at the Ministry of Home Affairs, Phanindra Mani Pokharel, said two helicopters had been deployed for search operations, noting that visibility was low.

"The bad weather is likely to hamper the search operation. The visibility is so poor that nothing can be seen," Pokharel said.

Nepal's aviation industry has boomed in recent years, carrying goods and people between difficult terrains, foreign trekkers and climbers. The industry has poor safety records due to insufficient training and

maintenance. The European Union (EU) had banned all Nepali airlines from its airspace over safety concerns, as the Himalayan country has been known for some of the world's most remote and tricky runways, surrounded by snowcapped peaks with approaches that pose a challenge for even accomplished pilots.

The weather can also change quickly in the mountains, creating treacherous flying conditions.

In March 2018, a United States-Bangla Airlines plane crashed near Kathmandu's notoriously difficult-toapproach international airport, killing 51 people.

The flight from the Bangladeshi capital, Dhaka crash-landed and skidded into a football field where it burst into flames, as 20 passengers miraculously escaped the burning wreckage, but sustained various degrees of injuries.

An investigation found that the captain suffered an emotional breakdown during the flight, distracting the freshly qualified co-pilot who was at the controls when it crashed.

The report said air traffic control also confused the two ends of the runway, but concluded this had no impact on the flight.

In 2019 three people died when a plane veered off the runway and hit two helicopters while taking off near Mount Everest. The accid

The accident happened at Lukla airport, which is the main gateway to the Everest region and is reputed to be one of the most difficult in the world for landing and take-off.

Also in 2019, Nepal's Minister of Tourism, Rabindra Adhikari, was among seven people killed, when a chopper crashed in the country's hilly east.

This month Nepal's second international airport opened at Bhairahawa, aiming to give Buddhist pilgrims from across Asia access to the Buddha's birthplace in nearby Lumbini.

The \$76 million project will ease pressure on the overburdened Kathmandu International Airport.
